From the Principal's Desk



Overcome the barriers so that all may learn

The Australian Curriculum describes a continuum of learning for the development of a social capability. According to this continuum, students develop a social capability as they learn to build effective relationships, be independent, and undertake successful learning.

One important aspect of developing a social capability is students using cohesive and coherent speech to express and share ideas, information, and understandings. Students must learn to use spoken language to entertain, inform and persuade audiences for an increasing range of purposes. They must learn to use spoken language to collaborate and cooperate with others as they complete tasks, play games, build friendships, and manage respectful relationships.

However, for some students such as those who experience a disability, learning to use spoken language has significant barriers. At Ashfield Public School, for example, there are students who are nonspeaking with autism, who are hearing impaired, or who have selective mutism. For these students there are challenges to developing spoken language, such as being unable to speak clearly and without interference, or understand what others are saying. For these students there are often developmental delays in their ability to use receptive and expressive language and therefore they are at risk of reduced academic achievement, social isolation and low self-esteem. to make adjustments that enable students who experience a disability to tackle the barriers associated with developing and effectively using spoken language.

One adjustment used at Ashfield Public School is the implementation of augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) systems whereby hand signs and pictures represent and link things with spoken words. When used consistently, an ACC system increases understanding of what people are saying, and increases the ability to make requests, answer questions and share comments. There are many ACC systems, some which use electronic devices to generate speech. The ACC system chosen for a particular student should best fit their strengths and learning needs and be used at school and home.

Another adjustment is the use of hearing technology such as the Roger Touchscreen Mic which is compatible with cochlear implants and hearing devices or the Soundfield system which consists of a microphone and loudspeaker to deliver the teacher's voice at a consistent level across the classroom or learning space.

Alongside making adjustments, a school and classroom teachers must create an inclusive educational environment where all students are respected and valued for their strengths and are supported to participate, learn, develop and succeed. All students must be provided with high quality and accessible educational opportunities that enable them to enjoy fulfilling, productive and responsible lives.

At Ashfield Public making adjustments for students who face barriers to learning and using spoken language, is one example of how we support the progress and selfbelief of all students as successful learners

What is Inclusive Education?

Why is inclusive education important?

- ✓ It improves learning for all children both those with and without disabilities.
- ✓ It promotes understanding, reduces prejudice and strengthens social integration.
- ✓ It ensures that children with disabilities are equipped to work and contribute economically and socially to their communities.

What are Inclusive education systems

- They support for teachers and students teachers need training and guidance, and students need to be provided with services to overcome barriers to learning.
- ✓ They promote respect for diversity and inclusive learning.
- They have high expectations of all students with teachers investing in and supporting all children.
- They have strong partnerships with parents, organisations that support people with disabilities so as to benefit from the widest possible experience and knowledge.

Requirements to make inclusive education happen

- An end to discrimination
- An end to excluding children with disabilities
- ✓ Access to primary and secondary education with sufficient numbers of accessible and inclusive schools, including for children with disabilities caught in crisis and emergencies.
- Practical support or adaptations for students to enable them to learn

 this is called 'reasonable accommodation.'
- ✓ Individual education plans for children with disabilities setting out what accommodations and support they need.
- Services for specific impairments such as learning braille or sign language, classroom reorganisation and accessible learning materials.
- Teachers adequately trained to work in inclusive schools.

Gardening News

Welcome to the second gardening report this term!

Our harmony garden currently has many citrus trees, strawberry plants, a plant (that we think is of a melon), a strange berry bush (that we have not identified yet), etc. Recently, we have also grown carrots. For this gardening report, we will focus on potatoes!



Potatoes are very high in nutrition and minerals like potassium, fibre, iron, vitamin B6, vitamin C, and magnesium, thus, making them highly beneficial to our health, but did you know that you can grow these fantastic vegetables in the comfort of your garden, with the guidance of our simple, and helpful procedure?

How to grow potatoes

- 1. Dig or find a 40-50cm hole in the ground
- 2. Fill the hole 10-20cm with mixed compost and potting mix
- 3. Place the seed in the hole
- 4. Cover the seed with 10-20cm of compost mixed with straw or grass clippings
- 5. Water these seeds around 2.54-5.08cm of water each week (the soil should be moist 20.32-25.4cm underground)

Tip: Make sure you keep your growing potato out of direct sunlight; otherwise, it may turn green

Variegation Report

To recap last week's news, we explained what variegation is in plants and why they are so rare, expensive and hard to grow. This week we will be discussing different types of variegated plants.



Pink princess philodendron

This plant is popular among plant parents because of its distinct pink colour. Originating in Columbia, this plant is pretty costly, cuttings costing up to \$100.



Syngonium red spot

Native to central and south America, this plant is known for its dazzling tri-coloured leaves (dark green, light green, pink). It's a great addition to many homes due to its vibrant and different colours. A tiny seedling can be more than \$10!



Extra Fact!

Philodendron Spiritus Sancti

One of the rarest species of philodendrons, this plant was native to Espirito Santo,

Brazil; this plant is an endangered species, and there's more of it kept in households than in the wild.

Recipe of the Week

Fried Rice

Ingredients:

- 4 Eggs
- 3 cups of cooked rice in a big bowl
- 2 strands of scallions
- Salt
- Oil



Equipment:

- Cooking Pan
- Spoon
- Cutting board
- Knife
- 3 bowls

Equipment:

- 1. Crack the eggs in a bowl.
- Pour the yolk into the rice and leave the egg white in the bowl.
- 3. Thoroughly mix the yolk with the spoon and the rice until each grain has been coated in some yolk.
- 4. Put the scallions on the cutting board and evenly dice them.
- 5. Pour the diced scallions into the egg white.
- 6. Sprinkle 5 pinches of salt into the egg white.
- 7. Pour oil onto the pan and turn the heat up.
- Pour the egg white into the pan and cook until all the egg white is edible.
- 9. Put the cooked egg white into a bowl.
- 10. Pour oil onto the pan and turn the heat up.
- 11. Pour the egg into the rice while the rice is cooking.
- 12. Put 5 pinches of salt into rice while the rice is cooking.
- 13. Serve the fried rice.
- 14. Enjoy!
